Heard Museum's World Championship Hoop Dance Contest Celebrates 35 Years

PHOENIX – The World Championship Hoop Dance Contest, a cornerstone for cultural preservation spotlighting hoop dancing, will return to the Heard Museum for its 35th year on Feb. 15 and 16!

The annual championship attracts more 100 dancers from diverse tribal backgrounds throughout the country who will display their masterful skills at the event, carrying on the traditions of hoop dance.

During the event, guests can enjoy delicious food and drink from local vendors and the Heard Museum's award-winning restaurant. Opportunities to engage in hoop-themed family activities, explore offerings from community partners, and shop official merchandise from the Official Hoop Dance Merch Booth will also be available. For those unable to attend in person, event streaming partner Gila River Broadcasting will present a livestream of the event hosted online at Heard.org/Event/World-Championship-Hoop-Dance-Contest/, ensuring that the spirit of the contest reaches far and wide.

The World Championship Hoop Dance Contest is a culmination of dozens of community members who show up as dedicated staff, emcees, singers, families and supporters including:

- Arena Emcee Dennis Bowen, who has committed over 30 years of live coverage
- · Arena Director Eric Manuelito, who flawlessly orchestrates the competition's flow
- The Northern and Southern Drum Groups, The Cozad Singers and Thunder Boy Singers, providing the heartbeat of the event

Since the first World Championship hosted at the Heard Museum, this event has continued the profound history of hoop dancing within Indigenous communities.

The 35th Annual World Championship Hoop Dance Contest will take place at the Heard Museum on

Saturday, Feb. 15 and Sunday, Feb. 16 from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Ticket prices for the event are as follows (two-day event package): adults are \$46.80; seniors (65+) are \$39.60; military members are \$39.60 (with valid ID); university/college students with a valid ID are \$19.80; children (6-17) are \$19.80; all children 5 years and under are free, American Indian Adults and Children (with Tribal ID or CIB) are \$19.80 and Heard Museum members are \$37.80.
